**Meeting Notes:** 

#### 1. Welcome & introductions

Mark Turner welcomed all attendees to the third meeting of the 'Nature Recovery' Group and introduced himself as the Group Lead and Grace O'Connell as the Group's support.

Mark Turner then covered the Agenda for the meeting which included:

Every attendee then introduced themselves to the Group, including their name, organisation, and job role (see attendee list above).

#### 2. Recap of work programme

#### a) Explaining the Nature Recovery Group to interested parties

- Mark Turner demonstrated activities the Group intends to do to help maintain School membership and partnership. These include:
  - Legislation and policy updates

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- Updating resources i.e. maintaining the School library and all resources that range through five stages beginner/ intermediate /expert/ advanced /leader and making sure the School's resource bank is as rich and up to date as possible
- **Events** The Group has run two very successful webinars so far with support from Julia Baker at Mott MacDonald. Please find both linked below
- Collecting case studies e.g. As Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG) in England for certain projects is now a legal requirement, the School would massively appreciate any case studies that showcase examples of Biodiversity Net Gain done well and the art of the possible
- **Topics promotion** (e.g. Green/Blue Infrastructure)
- Intervention points framework The School Group is very diverse in its approach and how it splits down markets/topics across the built environment and value chain from design through to build/operation, in-use, deconstruction etc.
- Whole built environment life cycle We have to consider the whole built environment life cycle through our approach including over time, impacts from supply chain, materials and product choices etc. We want this to be a key area of focus in the Nature Recovery Group to help ensure that we do good things here but also positively influence nature recovery elsewhere in the World (also see c. below)

## b) Nature Recovery Group intervention points framework

- Mark Turner showcased the Nature Group's intervention points framework (see below) and other various interconnected leadership groups within the School
- All Leadership Groups in the School **should** have an interest in the nature recovery agenda and maintain links and build these up over time
- Mark Turner then asked attendees if there was anything missing in the framework and to offer back any ideas.

#### c) Recap of work programme – initial priorities

- Mark Turner summarised the overall work programme of the Group so far. This included:
  - Setting up the group Including creating a title, drafting a terms of reference document. The Group still requires a chair
  - Confirm cross sector approach This relates back to the intervention framework. The Group should refer to all sectors, tiers and the whole value chain. There is a crucial requirement to influence supply chains and associated impacts on local areas, communities and ecosystems
  - Agree scope and work of partnership The Group will encompass all aspects of the built environment including planning, design, construction, management & maintenance



- Initial resource review A sub-group has started an initial review, but the majority of the library still needs development. See 3. Resource update below

- Grace explained since the last Group meeting in November, we have added some new resources to the School library. These included:

## a) <u>Resource review</u>

- Grace explained to the group the progress so far on the resource review of all preexisting 'biodiversity and ecology' resources in the School library
- There are around 152 resources to review in total
- Around 20% of all CURRENT resources so far have been reviewed
- Grace asked for any extra volunteers who have time and capacity to help with the resource review to get in contact with her and can set up a call to explain the process
- This review work will run into the next financial year and forms part of the Group's business planning priorities.

## b) Learning Pathways

- Grace explained the feature of learning pathways in the School. See detail below:
- Learning Pathways are an exciting feature in the School which allow you to allocate specific resources to a specific audience and track their progress through the awarding of badges and downloadable reports
- The School's learning pathways are a tool to embed sustainability learning within an organisation and down the supply chain
- Grace then explained that currently no 'nature' related learning pathways exists in the School
- An opportunity exists for the Group to help upskill users of the School in this related area and for Partners to develop these for their supply chain and anyone new or beginner who wants to start learning about this subject
- Michael McDermott raised the point regarding the 'Waste, Resource Efficiency & Circular Economy in Scotland' learning pathways that waste regulation in Scotland is changing and suggested this recommended resource to read further. Link to SEPA's consultation document on Environmental Authorisations (Scotland) regulations 2018

## 4) Training Programme – this FY 23/24

- Mark presented a table of all previous webinars and workshops hosted in the last financial year (since April 2023) related to the topic of nature (see full slide deck for details)
- The Group has delivered two successful webinars so far with support from Julia Baker. Both are hosted on the School's library here:
  - An Introduction to BNG and TNFD with Mott MacDonald: Webinar Recording
  - <u>Biodiversity enhancement policies across the UK similarities and differences</u> with Mott MacDonald: Webinar Recording
- Mark then explained the Group would like to run approximately one event every two months for the next financial year (2024-2025)
- Ross Primmer, a colleague within Action Sustainability also helps the School out with delivering Introduction to Biodiversity webinars as part of the event programme each year
- The Group is planning on delivering a virtual conference (VC) on the 22<sup>nd</sup> May to coincide with International Biological Diversity Day
- Mark presented one suggestion for the virtual conference to be a reflection piece on mandatory BNG at the end of summer it is key the Group and all our Partners remain active voices on this topic
- Mark then introduced the next Jamboard exercise to ask the attendees what they would like to see in terms of the wider training programme for the next year and what they would like to contribute.

- Ross Primmer Including webinar content on understanding global impacts of decisions and supply chain is vital
- Emma Thompson from a Taziker perspective it would be useful to collaborate with Network Rail/National Highways to get their perspective on delivery for suppliers and especially for Network Rail impacts on restricted land (de-vegetation). It could be useful for a webinar that gives insight into whether they have dealt with these sort of challenges before and any successful projects as case studies?

#### Jamboard exercise – Virtual Conference

- Ross Primmer explained that the Group is running a virtual conference on the 22<sup>nd</sup>
  May to coincide with International Biological Diversity Day
- The VC is intended to be 2 hours and expected 1000 attendee registration and 500 total attendees
- Attendees were asked to think about what the virtual conference should focus on and what topics are of strategic importance e.g. BNG/equivalents, case studies of

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BNG gone well, what happens when it goes badly, deeper supply chain impacts? Rewilding? What are NGOs saying?
