4.3 Making existing resources more accessible EJ & Will There are hundreds of resources available in the School on modern slavery, but it can be hard to find the resources you need. Making this process easier and more efficient is key. Agreed actions: Develop and communicate new modern slavery learning pathways (collaborate with procurement group for procurement / supply chain) – linking these to the 2 resources in section 4.2. Create interactive tool to search for resources under the key headings of BS 25700 e.g. leadership and commitment, training and awareness, recruitment. 8 Workshop: Due Diligence Maturity Guidance

Feedback, Group 1:

- Outcomes: measure where we are, use the guidance to improve, measure where suppliers can improve.
- Current resources used: annual maturity assessment of modern slavery, internal due diligence guidance documents but not MS specific, Independent Anti-Slavery Commissioners framework, SCSS resources.
- Ideal format: questionnaire and guidance document

Feedback Group 2:

- Outcomes: quick and easy to use e.g. a checklist, simple language.
- Current resources used: training videos, learning pathways, internal workshops aligned to SCSS objectives
- Ideal format: consider different learnings/engagement styles, posters around the site, more interactive.

Feedback Group 3:

- Outcomes: breakdown of roles and responsibilities and how they can offer support, what does good look like, guidance on what we do with result of due diligence.
- Current resources used: risk matrix from heat mapping, common assessment standard, supply chain audit, site audit guidance.
- Ideal format: combine with other sustainability topics. Collaborate with the procurement group?

Feedback Group 4:

 Outcomes: structured under functions and roles/responsibilities, eligible for different suppliers and organisations, helping users understand how they can effect change in their own organisation and others. Capture the built environment as a whole, not just construction.



- Resources used: strong together resources around onsite toolkits and purchasing practices, European rental association resources.
- Ideal format: spider diagram showing visually how you are performing. Excel filters responses and variables such as type of organisation etc.

Key points agreed in the follow up discussion:

- This needs to cover both an organisation's approach and the procurement / supply chain aspect
- Maturity guidance / assessment needs to be simple to use, enable people to understand what good looks like, and signpost to resources that can help them progress
- Key headings in BS 25700 could be a useful starting point
- Use the School's existing assessment functionality (like the people / sustainability / FIR maturity assessments) as the key tool this will minimise development costs as the functionality already exists, and will enable the development of actions plans, linking to resources based on maturity.
